


In the UK, Steiner schools are moving away from maintaining a traditionally marginal presence within the field of educational provision. The advent of state-funded Steiner academies and the opportunities now open to existing Steiner Waldorf schools as well as to brand new initiatives is revealing the high level of interest in this unique style of education.

Inevitably, this leads to a situation where Waldorf practice and its underpinning theories become subject to critical review and evaluation. In similar vein,

state-funded institutions offering care and social pedagogy based on Steiner principles find themselves in continuing critical dialogue with funding and quality assurance agencies.

It is in this context that the new Masters has been introduced; it aims to provide a platform where Steiner educational theory and practice can become part of mainstream educational discourse, where you, as graduate teachers and researchers, working with mainstream and Steiner academics, can contribute to a de-marginalisation of the pedagogical traditions of Steiner Waldorf education.



The programme aims to do this, not only from a UK perspective but, more widely, out of consideration of Waldorf education as a world phenomenon which has developed in over 60 countries across the world.

What will I study?

Since the inception of the first Waldorf School in 1919, teachers in Steiner schools have aimed to provide models of an educational approach they believe is particularly appropriate for our technical and scientific age. As you progress through this programme you will have the opportunity to review critically these aims, looking at past and present Waldorf practice in the light of today's educational environment, considering current ideas on child development, reflecting on the ways pedagogies mirror and determine cultures, thinking about the ideas that determine educational policies and the effects policies have on the practice and values espoused by teachers.

In addition, you will have the opportunity to look at the significance of Steiner's concept of the child as an evolving spiritual being, relating this to current notions of creativity and intuition in teaching.

Start date and duration

This part-time programme will normally take 3 years to complete and there will be one cohort starting each year. Contact us for start date details.

Residential

This programme is structured around seven residential study weekends. Each weekend begins on a Friday at 5pm and runs through to Sunday at 12 noon. The residential weekends will take place in Canterbury although it may be possible to negotiate the venue with the group.

Tuition fees

Fees for academic year 2013/14 are:

- Stage 1 £2085
- Stage 2 £2085
- Stage 3 £2210

The residential weekends are an additional cost of approximately £220 per weekend which includes accommodation and full board.



Canterbury Christ Church is a modern, multi-campus university, and is the largest centre of higher education in Kent for the public services – notably teacher training, nursing, policing, health and social care.
